COMMENTS FROM MAYOR DONALD HARTILL

This winter the Village Department of Public Works staff has again taken care of the snow removal from the Village streets. So far, we have not had any large snowstorms but two to four inch falls take almost as much salt and fuel for the trucks as big storms do. Winter is not over yet. One of the largest snowstorms which dumped nearly two feet was towards the end of March in the late 90's. The ten inches of heavy wet snow that we received this past week is an indication.

We will be busy as soon as the weather warms and dries a bit repairing the usual winter damage to the roadways. Potholes will continue to be patched as soon as we hear about them and more permanent repairs will be carried out as soon as the asphalt batch plants re-open in the spring. I noticed in the Ithaca Journal the other day that pot holes made the front page so maybe other municipalities are beginning to pay attention. Crack sealing and shoulder repairs along with street sweeping and re-striping will be carried out as soon as weather permits. We will be resurfacing a number of roadways in the Village as part of our long-range maintenance program this summer, so it will be a busy summer. The other rite of spring is the brush pickup on May 7th. The guidelines appear later in the newsletter and I hope you will take advantage of this opportunity.

A new water main along Northwood Road to Coventry Walk will be installed this summer and will provide a second path to the ground tank at the airport in addition to the line along Dart Drive. It was scheduled for completion last fall but work on the new village park consumed all of our available resources. This redundancy will enable work on either line without serious reduction in flow to the rest of the Village served by that tank. There are several other small water main replacement projects that will be carried out this summer. These projects are all part of our long-range infrastructure maintenance program. By carrying out these projects in a planned way, we avoid the serious failures that are very expensive to repair when they occur.

We will be carrying out a detailed design study this spring and summer to expand our sewer service area in the Village. The plan is to install the new sewer mains during the next construction season. Private developers in the Town of Lansing will pay for about one third of the cost. A joint project with the Village of Cayuga Heights in the Highgate Road area that will relieve several reliability issues in that region will be carried out this summer.

We have completed the budget process for the coming fiscal year and have a proposed budget that will be presented at a Budget Public Hearing scheduled for 7:40 pm on April 2nd. The assessed value of the properties in the Village has increased by 2.8 % compared to last year. We have to reconstruct between one and one-half to two miles of our roadways each year to keep our eighteen miles of roads in good shape, and it will be partly paid for using funds from our capital reserve fund. In analyzing our long-term needs, we have found it necessary to increase the property tax levy to avoid reducing our capital reserve fund to an unhealthy level. The proposed tax rate for this year is \$1.40 per thousand dollars assessment that yields a property tax levy that is 11% above last year's levy. Over the years, the Village has systematically reduced its reliance on New York State financial aid so that budget issues in Albany have only minor effects on Village finances. Copies of the proposed budget are available as usual in the Village Office and it is posted on the Village website.

The Village of Lansing continues to have one of the lowest tax rates in New York State for the level of services that we supply. Good fiscal management and out-sourcing as much of our needs as possible makes this all possible.

I would urge all residents who are interested to attend our Board meetings so that your input can be heard as the Boards go about their business.

Finally, Village elections for two Trustees will be held from noon to 9 pm on Tuesday, April 24th at the new Village Office (2405 N. Triphammer Road). I encourage you to vote! Be sure to also help us name our parks by completing a survey when you come in to vote. Details on this are later in the newsletter.

Budget Public Hearing

The Public Hearing on the proposed Village of Lansing Budget for Fiscal Year 2018-2019 is scheduled for Monday, April 2nd at 7:40pm. Village residents attending the meeting have the right to provide written and oral comments. The aggregate salaries for the Board of Trustees are proposed in the amount of \$24,000, \$6,000 for each Trustee, and the salary for the Mayor is proposed in the amount of \$14,000. \$2,700,881 in appropriations is proposed for the General Fund. The proposed General Tax Rate is \$1.40 per \$1,000 of assessed value. A special assessment of \$.03 per \$1,000 of assessed value and \$6.70 per sewer unit is proposed for the Sewer Collector debt payment. Copies of the proposed budget may be inspected at the Village of Lansing Office during office hours: Monday -Thursday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. The Proposed Budget is also posted on the Village Webpage.

Water Bills

Village of Lansing Residents receive a bill quarterly at the beginning of January, April, July, and October. All water/sewer bills are due by the 20th of that month and can be either mailed in or you may bring your payment to the Village Office at 2405 N. Triphammer Rd. If you would like to drop a payment off after hours, there is a secure drop box inside the entry way to our administration building. The Village of Lansing is part of the Southern Cayuga Lake Intermunicipal Water Commission (SCLIWC). Please read the SCLIWC article below on how the new billing structure may affect you.

SOUTHERN CAYUGA LAKE INTERMUNICIPAL WATER COMMISSION

Water Rate Increases as of April 2018 Billing for Village Residents

The Commission has voted to change the water billing structure, effective January 1, 2018. This change will impact your quarterly water bill starting with the April 2018 billing.

The current water billing structure is based on a minimum of 10,000 gallons per three-month period per billing unit. Usage above 10,000 gallons in the billing period is billed at the rate of \$4.44 per thousand gallons. This water billing structure has been in place since 1996. **Beginning January 1, 2018**, the water billing structure will call for a minimum of 5,000 gallons per three-month period per billing unit. Usage above 5,000 gallons in the billing period will be billed at the rate of \$4.96 per thousand gallons. *Please note your municipality adds a 40% surcharge to the Bolton Point rate, so your actual bill reflects the combined rate.*

Customers using 9,000 gallons or less per three-month period, per billing unit, will see a decrease in their bill, assuming the same amount of water is used. Customers using more than 9,000 gallons per three-month period, per billing unit, will see an increase in their bill, assuming the same amount of water is used, as total usage over the minimum will be billed on straight consumption. The largest increases will be seen by the Commission's largest users, and these customers could see an increase in the Bolton Point water rate up to 11.7 %.

There are three main objectives of the new water billing rate structure. The first is to increase fairness to all end users by more closely aligning billing fees to water consumption or usage. Secondly, to ensure the water rate generates enough revenue to allow the Commission to continue to provide high quality water at the lowest possible cost. And last, to encourage and reward water conservation efforts.

Water billing rates are the predominant means by which the Commission recovers its costs of producing and distributing water, while maintaining adequate fund reserve levels to cushion against unforeseen future variation in costs and/or usage. The Commission's water rate is evaluated annually to ensure adequate revenues will be collected to pay for operations and maintenance costs and to provide funding for capital improvement projects. Past capital improvement projects have included a water storage tank and transmission main replacements, water plant pump and motor replacements, and the 2016 Automated Metering Infrastructure (AMI) project.

VOTE FOR VILLAGE TRUSTEES AND PARK NAMES

The Village Elections will be held Tuesday, April 24, 2018. Voting will take place at the Village Office at 2405 N. Triphammer Road from noon to 9pm. This year, we will elect two Trustees. Absentee ballot applications are available at www.votetompkins.com. You can also stop by and pick up an application located on the brochure rack in the foyer of the Village Office or call the Board of Elections to obtain the applications and ballots. The Board of Elections is located at 128 E. Buffalo Street, Ithaca, NY, and open M-F 8:30-4:30. For more information, contact Commissioners Elizabeth W. Cree (R) or Stephen M. At the upcoming Village Election, on April 24th, Village residents will also be able to vote for Village park names. A special table will be set up in the foyer of the Village Hall (between the two front doorways) with park-name ballots. Each voter will be allowed to vote to help name four parks.

The front of the ballot will contain brief instructions and a list of park-name nominees for the following parks: Dart-Parcel park (our new park on Northwoods Drive), Uptown Road Park (across the street from Dankert Park), Pocket Park (at the corner of Craft Road and Leif's Way), and Ayla Way/Nor Way Park (a future park within the Lansing Trails neighborhood.) A small map will be printed beside each park location. Voters will select one of the names nominated for each park, or they may write-in a different name for each park.

At the time of this newsletter's printing the names nominated for each park are:

- **Dart-Parcel Park (Northwoods Drive)** - Valerie Gyrisco Park, Marian Hartill Park, and Rita and Sy Smidt Park.
- **Uptown Road Park (across from Dankert Park)** - Valerie Gyrisco Park, Ned Hickey Park, Rita and Sy Smidt Park, and Global Village Park.
- **Pocket Park (Craft Rd. and Leif's Way)** - Valerie Gyrisco Park, Ned Hickey Park, and Rita and Sy Smidt Park.
- **Ayla Way/Nor Way Park (future park)** - Valerie Gyrisco Park, Ned Hickey Park, and Rita and Sy Smidt Park.

More nominees might be identified before the election and included in the special ballots. Please plan to vote in the Village's election for Trustees, then stop by the Park-Name Ballot table and help us name your parks.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

In spite of the usual difficult winter weather, there have been a few construction projects taking place in the Village. The Cayuga View Apartments, a 4-story, 59- unit senior living complex now dominates the skyline on Cinema Drive. There should be residents in there by the Fall.

At 1020 Craft Road, the eyesore that was the old Wheaton Sheet Metal Co. building, doesn't look like much right now, but it will soon, with a whole new exterior siding and parking lot. Half of it will become a medical office, with either an additional medical or light business office in the other half.

The following are activities that are new or progressing this past period:

1. Issued a Special Permit for the Bomax apartments after a traffic study and environmental activity review were approved. No construction activity, to date.
2. Still in discussion over the number of buildings and their design for the senior living units in Lansing Meadows PDA on Oakcrest Road.
3. In discussions with the owners of the Shops at Ithaca Mall to create a PDA for the purpose of subdivision.
4. A developer presented a possible development for 12 townhouses on a less-than-2-acre lot behind M&T Bank on Triphammer Road. Access to this lot is in question.
5. H&J Hospitality, a party events business (in the old Bookers Backyard) on Route 34 is applying for additional parking on the property and across Route 34.

Deborah Dawson left the Planning Board to assume her elected position on the Tompkins County Legislature. She was especially helpful in composing a great deal of the Village Comprehensive Plan. We wish her well in her new challenge. Jim McCauley has moved up from Alternate to Regular Board Member. At the same time, we welcome Monica Moll as our new Alternate. Monica was previously on our Board of Zoning Appeals and is experienced in the real estate business and rental housing.

As usual, we welcome the Village public to attend our Planning Board meetings, which usually are held the second Monday and the last Tuesday of each month, 7:00 - 9:30pm.

Brush Pick-Up

YOUTH PROGRAMS

Ithaca Youth Bureau

The Ithaca Youth Bureau (IYB), a public multi-service agency established in 1948, provides a broad variety of recreation and youth development programs to promote the health, happiness, and well-being of all youth and families in the greater Ithaca area. They serve more than 7,500 youth annually, aged 0-20 years, through a wide array of programs including:

- A tot stay-and-play program
- Academic support
- After school programs
- Lessons
- Mentoring programs
- Recreation mainstreaming services
- Sports leagues
- Summer camps
- Theater workshops
- Tournaments
- Job and skill training and subsidized employment for youth

In addition to recreation and after school initiatives that serve the general youth population, the youth development programs do strategic outreach to economically disadvantaged and under-served youth.

The Youth Bureau helps prepare youth to live successful lives as adults by providing a variety of recreation and youth development opportunities that will help youth develop to their full potential. They lend support to discouraged youth who are struggling to find their place in the world, help the program participants understand that all people have a place in this world, and that together we can create a better tomorrow.

Tompkins County Youth Services Department Update

The Tompkins County Youth Services Department (TCYSD) and the Youth Services Board (YSB) invest time, resources, and funding in communities to enable all youth to thrive in school, work and life. County youth are provided opportunities that allow them to thrive from childhood to adulthood. The YSB meets once per month to monitor TCYSD progress and to plan for future youth-related needs.

YSB/TCYSD Staff Advocacy Retreat

On Saturday, March 10, Youth Services Board members and TCYSD staff participated in an advocacy retreat from 9 AM to noon. Joanne Florino, a consultant for The Philanthropy Roundtable, and former senior vice president for public policy, presented attendees information and guidance on advocating for youth services and funding. Following Ms. Florino's presentation, the participants identified audiences, topics, and resources to advocate for county youth services and needs.

Preliminary key components for future YSB/TCYSD advocacy for youth include: an elevator speech, an advocacy calendar, sharing public event information, sharing public meetings of villages and towns information, creation of a one-sheet "who we are" handout, customized handouts for diverse, local events, developing our story and our "ask" of our audiences, and filling our vacant board seats.

Joint Youth Commission Update

The Joint Youth Commission (JYC), comprising members from the Villages of Lansing and Cayuga Heights and the Towns of Ithaca and Caroline, meets monthly to recommend use of municipal funding for youth programs and prioritize two broad areas for building skills in middle school and high school age youth: first-time youth employment (including career exploration, building job skills, and paid youth jobs) and youth development and life skills. The JYC currently funds The Learning Web, Cornell’s Cooperative Extension, Ithaca Youth Bureau’s Youth Employment Service, and the Coddington Road Community Center Camp.

In 2017, 321 youth were served by the funded programs (plus an additional 16 JYC youth were served by Cooperative Extension programs offered by other commissions.) The breakdown per municipalities includes: Village of Lansing (26 youth), Town of Caroline (48 youth), Town of Ithaca (194 youth), and other municipalities (53 youth.) VILLAGE GREENWAY-LANDSCAPING COMMITTEE UPDATE

For the past several months, the Village of Lansing Greenway Committee has reviewed and is finalizing the updated Greenway Plan. The updated plan builds upon the 1994 Greenway Plan as a guide for the development and maintenance of the network of parks, natural habitats, and recreation systems consisting of pathways, walkways, park land, and designated green or open space areas within the boundaries of the Village of Lansing.

The new Greenway Plan will provide the Committee members’ recommendations to the Village Board of Trustees for short- and long-term goals related to developing and maintaining greenways and providing public access to those greenways. Plan appendices will provide locations and descriptions of Village parks, walkways, trails, and village-owned landscaping. Additionally, the Committee has worked with the Village DPW staff to design the new Village Park on Northwoods Drive. The new park’s grounds were cleared, landscaping/bordering stones were installed, and two age-appropriate sets of playground equipment were installed. Work on the park will continue through the 2018-19 work season to finish a sports field, a basketball court, a pavilion, a surfaced parking area, and park trails. Benches and tables will be added when the grounds and trails are ready.

The Greenway-Landscaping Plan committee meets on the third Wednesday of each month from 3 to 4:30 p.m. in the Village Hall. All meetings are open to the public. I was appointed to the Tompkins County Soil and Water Conservation Board, a position in which I can be more supportive of agriculture in North Lansing. I have also been appointed to the County's Home Ownership Board and to the Board of Lifelong. Finally, I am committed to attending all meetings of the Tompkins County Industrial Development Agency.

As a candidate, I campaigned on the need for better communication between legislators and their constituents. It is my intention to send emails to interested constituents on a bi-monthly basis.
