COMMENTS FROM MAYOR DONALD HARTILL

This winter the Village Department of Public Works staff has again taken care of the snow removal from the Village streets, paths and sidewalks. The large snowstorm on February 3rd that left two feet of snow remained on the ground for nearly one month and was followed by several smaller storms that took almost as much salt and fuel for the trucks as the big storm did. Hopefully, we will not have too much more snow this spring season.

We will be busy as soon as the weather warms and dries a bit repairing the usual winter damage to the roadways. Potholes will continue to be patched as soon as we hear about them and more permanent repairs will be carried out as soon as the asphalt batch plants re-open in the spring. Crack sealing and shoulder repairs along with street sweeping and re-striping will be carried out as soon as weather permits. We will be resurfacing a number of roadways in the Village as part of our long-range maintenance program this summer so it will be a busy summer. The other rite of spring is the annual brush pickup by the Village and Town crews. The dates of the pickup and the guidelines appear later in the newsletter and I hope you will take advantage of this opportunity.

Installation of the new water main along Northwood Road to Coventry Walk was completed last summer and provides a second path to the ground tank at the airport in addition to the line along Dart Drive. This redundancy will enable work on either line without serious reduction in flow to the rest of the Village served by that tank. There are several other small water main replacement projects that will be carried out this summer. These projects are all part of our long-range infrastructure maintenance program. By carrying out these projects in a planned way, we avoid the serious failures that are very expensive to repair when they occur. We are still debating what to do about the water main along Warren Road that had two difficult failures this past winter.

This past summer also saw the completion of the storm water retention system along Northwood Road and the completion of the sidewalk along the roadway. It is heavily used by the local residents. This summer we plan to carry out the same renovations along Dart Drive making the Village a much more walkable community. This will add to our inventory of around six miles of sidewalks and trails.

Our engineers have carried out the detailed design that will expand our sewer service area in the Village. The plan will install new sewer mains during the coming construction season along East Shore Drive and Cayuga Heights Road. Private developers in the Town of Lansing will pay for about one third of the cost.

We have completed the budget process for the coming fiscal year and have a proposed budget that will be presented at a public hearing scheduled for 7:35 pm on April 5th. The assessed value of the properties in the Village has increased by 2.6 % compared to last year. We have to reconstruct between one and a half to two miles of our roadways each year to keep our eighteen miles of roads in good shape. This will include a portion of Graham Road West. The proposed tax rate for this year is \$1.50 per thousand dollars assessment. This is the same rate as last years and yields a property tax levy that is 2.6% above last year. Over the years, the Village has systematically reduced its reliance on New York State financial aid so that budget issues in Albany have only minor effects on Village finances. Copies of the proposed budget are available as usual in the Village Office and it is posted on the Village website.

The Village of Lansing continues to have one of the lowest tax rates in New York State for the level of services that we supply. Good fiscal management and out-sourcing as much of our needs as possible makes this all possible.

I would urge all residents who are interested to attend our Board meetings so that their input can be heard as the Boards go about their business.

Finally, Village elections for the Mayor and two Trustees will be held from noon to 9 pm on Tuesday, April 27th at the Village Office (2405 N. Triphammer Road). I encourage you to vote.

Budget Public Hearing

The Public Hearing on the proposed Village of Lansing Budget for Fiscal Year 2021-2022 will be April 5, 2021 via Zoom videoconference. If you would like to attend the meeting please email Jodi at clerk@vlansing.org to get the link. The proposed Budget is posted on the website. If you would like a copy mailed to you, please contact the office at 257-0424 ext.#2. Village residents have the right to provide written and oral comments. The aggregate salaries for the Board of Trustees are proposed in the amount of \$24,000, \$6,000 for each Trustee, and the salary for the Mayor is proposed in the amount of \$14,000. \$2,436,229 in appropriations is proposed for the General Fund. The proposed General Tax Rate will remain the same at \$1.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value.

Water/Sewer Bills

Village of Lansing Residents will receive a bill quarterly at the beginning of January, April, July, and October. All water/sewer bills are due by the 20th of that month and can be either mailed in or you may bring your payment to the Village Office at 2405 N. Triphammer Road. There is a secure drop box inside the entry way to our administration building for you to drop off your payment anytime. The Village of Lansing is part of the Southern Cayuga Lake Intermunicipal Water Commission (SCLIWC).

VILLAGE CODE & ZONING DEPARTMENT

It has been almost a year now since the 2020 Building Code of NYS was implemented. With that, I would remind everyone that there are numerous scenarios in which a building permit would be needed. Brush Pick-Up

Spring brush and limb pick-up will be provided by the Town and Village of Lansing Highway Departments on May 3rd. Residents are asked to leave all materials near the roadside by 6:00 am Monday morning. To assist the work crews, all limbs and brush (up to 5 inches in diameter) should be piled with the cut ends facing the same direction. The limbs should be no longer than 6 feet in length. Also, the piles should not be tied, but should be left loose. Please do not put out bags of yard waste. This pick up is only for limbs and brush.

SOUTHERN CAYUGA LAKE INTERMUNICIPAL WATER COMMISSION (SCLIWC)

Water /Sewer Rate Increases as of April 2020 Billing for Village Residents

In January 2021 SCLIWC raised their water rate from \$5.41 to \$5.60. The Village surcharge remains at 50%. The cost for 1,000 gallons of water has increased from \$8.11 to \$8.40. The Village of Cayuga Heights has also increased their sewer rate, so the new sewer rate is \$6.45 per 1,000 gallons of water.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

Planning Board meetings September through March continued via Zoom videoconference. The new major projects that were addressed over the past 6 months:

The Shops at Ithaca Mall

- The mall owners had submitted a request to the Planning Board to subdivide the mall allowing individual parcels created to be sold to various large anchor stores. Mall owners would retain ownership of the central core of the mall housing the restaurants and smaller shops. Because of the significant infrastructure issues identified early in the process, such as stormwater drainage and flooding and sanitary sewer issues, it took some time to create a plan of action and timeline for resolution of the issues. The mall representatives worked well with the Planning Board and mutual agreement was reached in March.

The Alcohol & Drug Council

- The Council came to the Planning Board in January for a Special Permit to renovate their building located at 2353 N Triphammer Rd to add sleeping areas for adult men and women who have been assessed to have mild to moderate substance disorders and are receiving treatment services.

Some Updates on Past Projects

Lansing Meadows Planned Development Area (aka BJ's PDA)

- Four triplex buildings (units 1-12) are still in process.
- Two additional triplex buildings are not yet begun.

Lansing Trails II

- The 12 completed townhouses on Nor Way have enjoyed almost immediate occupancy.
- The construction of additional units is ongoing as planned.

Planning Board member, Carolyn Greenwald, is running unopposed for the office of Trustee in the April 27th Village election. Carolyn has been with the Planning Board 'team' for six years and will be sorely missed. It is nice to know that her talents will not be lost, however, and she remains committed to serving the Village residents. Please show your support for Carolyn by voting the 27th. Her departure of course means that we will have a vacancy on the Planning Board. If you are interested in possibly joining the Planning Board, please let Jodi Dake, our Village Clerk know of your interest.

Until further notice Planning Board meetings continue via Zoom. You are always welcome at a meeting--the second Monday and the last Tuesday of each month, 7:00 - 9:30pm (holidays may impact the schedule). While we are meeting by Zoom it may be a convenient time to join us and get an idea of some of the issues that come before the Board. Community Solar Clean Energy Partnership with Solar Farms NY

In anticipation of the sun shining following a long winter, the Village of Lansing has entered into a Clean Energy Partnership with Solar Farms NY. This partnership will provide electricity discounts to Village residents, while simultaneously aiding the Village goal of becoming a registered Climate Smart Community.

Solar Farms NY (SFNY) provides solar generated electricity, distributed through the NYSEG network. Any Village resident that signs up for electricity service with SFNY will receive 5% off of the NYSEG supply and delivery charges (not the service charge) on their NYSEG bill and a one-time \$25 credit for using direct deposit. Through the partnership, the Village also receives \$100 per connected account, in addition to the added benefit of furthering the Village goal of being a Climate Smart Community and a Clean Energy Community. Both programs are administered by the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA) and being a registered community allows the Village to access grant funding to achieve further energy smart goals. To register for community solar, all you need is the PoD ID number, found on your NYSEG bill. The step-by-step process accessed through the above link is simple to follow and once registered, you will receive an email from SFNY detailing the timeline of becoming connected to a community solar farm. From registering to being connected will take approximately three months, as the solar farm needs to accurately determine your energy usage and ensure they are generating the solar energy to service your demands. Once connected you will continue to receive a single bill from NYSEG with a credited discount for using solar-generated electricity. Currently, SFNY operates three solar farms in the county, so your solar energy will be locally sourced. Go solar, Go local and Save!

Recreation Programming is Back!

After a one-year hiatus due to the COVID-19 pandemic, recreation activities are currently being scheduled for the spring, summer and fall, through the Ithaca Youth Bureau. These programs are supported by the Recreation Partnership, a collaboration of 10 municipalities in Tompkins County. As a member of the Recreation Partnership, all Village residents are eligible for discounted program fees.

Programming is available for all school-age children and covers a wide range of sporting activities, including basketball, baseball, lacrosse, sailing, tae kwon do, running, fencing and tree climbing amongst others. Non-sporting activities, such as theatre, art and band/orchestra are also available, in addition to summer day camps that encompass a broad spectrum of activities. The Ithaca Youth Board is also looking for coaches and volunteers in order to continue providing quality activities at an affordable cost. As a thank you for your time, the fee for one of your children to participate in the activity will be waived.

Cayuga Lake Watershed Intermunicipal Organization Update

The Cayuga Lake Watershed Intermunicipal Organization (CLWIO) has undertaken several important organizational projects within the past months. It is working to prioritize 31 potential water quality projects that were submitted to the CLWIO Project Advisory Board for future grant submissions. The organization is also gathering information from current watershed members, potential members, and other regional watershed organizations to better align the organization's work with the needs of watershed members. The Education and Outreach Committee is working on educational materials and on updating the CLWIO's online presence to educate the public and watershed members on the goals, projects, and status of the watershed organization.

Fair-Funding Formula – The CLWIO Finance Committee developed a fair-funding formula to fund a watershed manager position for Cayuga Lake. The watershed manager will coordinate watershed-related issues, projects, and grants for all watershed members. The fair-funding formula is modeled after a similar formula enacted by the Seneca Watershed Intermunicipal Organization and is based on five municipal factors: gallons of water usage, percentage of land in the watershed, miles of shoreline, population density, and total assessed value. Municipalities would pay for two-thirds of the watershed manager salary and counties would pay for the remaining one-third of the salary. This funding formula will be considered for approval in April 2021 and, if approved, the new dues would be requested by the CLWIO in future municipality and county budget cycles. Climate Smart Communities Task Force Update

Greenhouse Gas Inventory - The Climate Smart Communities Task Force is completing its review of the Village of Lansing Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Inventory document for an upcoming presentation to the Village Trustees. The task force worked with the Cornell Cooperative Extension's Climate Smart Communities support team to collect Village energy usage data as a baseline for the GHG Inventory. The inventory is an accounting, analysis, and report of the GHG emissions resulting from the day-to-day operations of the Village government. It summarizes GHG emissions from the consumption of energy and materials in government buildings, from municipal vehicle fleets, from government-owned outdoor lighting, and from other sources. It is a foundational step toward setting realistic Village goals and tracking progress toward reducing operating costs, energy use, and GHG emissions. The CSC Task Force will use the GHG Inventory to propose a Climate Action Plan that will set goals and outline initiatives to reduce the Village-government greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.

Solar Farms NY - Task-force member, Simon Moll, also worked with our village clerk and the clean-energy supply company, Solar Farms NY, to lay the groundwork for the CSC action, "Solarize, Clean Heating & Cooling, or Solar for All Campaign." Through this action the Village will be able to launch a community campaign, offering residents the opportunity to purchase solar generated electricity at a discounted rate as compared to a "standard" NYSEG bill. Clean Energy Communities - The CSC Task Force received Trustees' permission to join the NYSERDA's Southern Tier Clean Energy Communities program to help the Village pursue its clean-energy initiatives. The CEC program also provides additional opportunities for the Village to access increased grant funding and earn recognition for its clean-energy efforts. The Village will receive continued CEC coordinator support and guidance for implementing high-impact clean energy actions to build community-wide resiliency and economic opportunity. County Youth Services Updates

The Village of Lansing does not have a Village-specific youth group; therefore, we participate in, and help fund, county-level youth services through the Youth Services Board and the Joint Youth Commission.

Youth Services Board - Through Zoom meetings, the Board continued its work advising the County's Youth Services Department (YSD) to advocate for, and support, Tompkins County youth through guidance and funding to local agencies and communities that plan and sponsor youth development programming. Housing for runaway and homeless youth (RHY) continues to be a challenge. Tompkins County lost one of its primary RHY housing options last year, and the YSD is working with state and county agencies, local communities, and private providers to secure a contract for RHY housing. The YSB also advised the YSD on monitoring and funding county agencies that support various youth-related services encompassing civic engagement and citizenship, youth education, family issues, and healthcare.

Joint Youth Commission (JYC) - The JYC also met remotely to monitor and guide local agencies and organizations to provide first-time youth employment and youth development opportunities. Currently, the JYC works with Cornell Cooperative Extension Rural Youth Services, The Learning Web, the IYB Youth Employment Services, Coddington Road's Counselor-In-Training Program, and the Ithaca Youth Entrepreneurship Market. Focusing on middle-school and high-school age youth, these groups provide first-time employment, employment training, career exploration, apprenticeships, youth development, life and social skills, healthy lifestyles and decision-making guidance. Recent JYC conversations with the youth programs revolved around the programs' adjustments to Covid-19 restrictions on in-person gatherings. Youth participation dropped dramatically once the pandemic restrictions were enacted, but programs report that participation has grown steadily for the last several months as youth become more comfortable with remote meetings and training sessions.

VILLAGE GREENWAY-LANDSCAPING COMMITTEE UPDATE

Part of this committee's charter is to review the Greenway Plan for needed updates. Since last Fall, the Village Greenway Committee has been reviewing the Plan and identified the following updates:

- Reference the Village's new Sidewalk Policy and Tree Ordinance (both in the works),
- Recommend that the Village's annual budget include funds for contracting with a landscaping service for Village greenways improvements,
- Update the plans information and maps for Village parks and trails, and
- Expand and refine the "Friends of Park" definition and propose tasks for these "Friends of Park" groups (see below for more details.)

After completing the proposed updates, the Greenway Committee will present the draft document to the Village Trustees, Planning Board, and Board of Zoning Appeals for review and revision. Once all changes are complete, the Trustees will approve release of the updated plan.

"Friends of Park" Groups – The Village Greenway Plan includes a reference to "Friends of Park" groups for Village parks and greenways. Do you enjoy visiting the parks in the Village? Do you enjoy gardening? Do you want to help your community by pitching in to keep the parks looking their best? If so, a "Friends of Park" group for your favorite park is calling. Each group comprises Village residents who live nearby, or regularly visit, a particular Village park or greenway. Members of the "Friends of Park" group would be asked to perform minor cleanup tasks while they visit the park or greenway – things like picking up litter, minor flower bed or shrub maintenance, etc. As the eyes and ears of the Village Department of Public

Works (DPW), Park Friends would report dangerous conditions or other situations that require immediate or major maintenance work to the Village Office. Members would NOT perform major work on park amenities, trails, shrubs, trees, etc.

TOMPKINS COUNTY LEGISLATURE

The first quarter of the calendar year is always a tense and busy time for the Legislature, as we keep a watchful eye on Albany to anticipate, and lobby for and against, whatever mandates and aid levels the Governor, Senate, and Assembly may be planning to include in the State budget. This year, the process has been particularly fraught. The County experienced millions of dollars of lost sales tax and casino revenue and incurred more millions in expenses relating to managing the pandemic and the needs it created for our residents, so budget issues for the next few years have assumed even more importance than usual. With several of my colleagues, I have participated in group lobbying efforts sponsored by NYSAC and attended by members of the State Senate and Assembly, their staff, and committee staff. We have also arranged and held our own meetings with Senators Helming, Oberacker, and O’Mara, and with Assembly Member Kelles. However, because so much of our State and local budget is dependent on the Federal stimulus package, we have also maintained close and consistent contact with helpful staff from Senator Schumer’s and Congressman Reed’s offices.

Another issue that has kept us all pretty busy is the “Reimagining Public Safety” initiative that arose in response to Governor Cuomo’s Executive Order 203. The order requires all local government entities that have a police or sheriff’s department to perform a comprehensive review of that department’s “deployment, strategies, policies, procedures, and practices,” and to develop a plan to improve them “for the purposes of addressing the particular needs” of the communities they serve and “to promote community engagement to foster trust, fairness, and legitimacy, and to address any racial bias and disproportionate policing of communities of color.” The County and the City of Ithaca engaged in an extensive outreach program to solicit their communities’ perceptions of and reactions to the County Sheriff’s Office and the IPD and submitted a report with 19 recommendations for change. One of those was a drastic reconfiguration of the IPD. That particular recommendation seems to have garnered 90% of the public’s attention. Most of the County Legislators, including myself, do not feel that the County should have any

say on whether the City of Ithaca decides to make such a drastic change on such short notice, and the County Legislature will not be voting on that recommendation. However, there are other recommendations that will have an impact on how the Sheriff and his deputies do their job, and the details of those recommendations, and additional background information, are available at <https://www2.tompkinscountyny.gov/ctyadmin/reimaginepublicsafety>. The Legislature has to vote on these recommendations (excluding those applicable exclusively to the IPD) on March 30, since the Executive Order requires us to “ratify a plan” and send it to Albany by April 1. TOMPKINS COUNTY ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Tompkins County Seeks Funding to Repair and Replace Septic Systems; Requesting Assistance from the Public; Fill out Brief Survey

Tompkins County is applying for a grant that could pay for 100% of the costs of repairing or replacing septic systems for some income-eligible households. These systems often cost more than \$10,000 – a major expense for most households. There are about 150 water customers in the Village of Lansing that still have a septic system. In order to successfully obtain grant funding, Tompkins County must demonstrate the need for this funding. To assist in this effort, Tompkins County is asking for the public’s help to measure interest and need by filling out a brief [survey](#).

If Tompkins County is successful in obtaining funding, there would be no cost to income-eligible households for the septic system replacements. Please fill out the survey if:

- Your septic system has to be pumped a lot, has backed up into the home, or is otherwise struggling to function; OR
- Your septic system is more than 20 years old; OR
- Your septic system is impacting a drinking water well.

The information submitted by residents will be used to meet a grant requirement – *a waiting list of low-to moderate-income households interested in this funding*. If funds are awarded to Tompkins County, the list may be used to notify eligible households that funds are available. The information collected will not be used for any other purposes.
