COMMENTS FROM THE MAYOR

This year we have had a relatively mild winter up until a few weeks ago and the cold continues with a light snow falling as I look out my window on this 4th day of March. As we did last year, this winter we have used mostly salt to reduce the ice and snow on our roadways instead of the mix of sand and salt that we have used in years past. This has resulted in much less dirt and dust buildup along the edges of the roadways and certainly has cut down on dust in our neighborhoods. Our sister municipalities' roadways have suffered more damage than ours but we will be busy as soon as the weather warms and dries a bit repairing the damage to ours. Pot holes will continue to be patched as soon as we hear about them and more permanent repairs will be carried out as soon as the asphalt plants open in the spring. Crack sealing and shoulder repairs along with street sweeping and re-striping will be carried out as soon as weather permits. The other rite of spring is the annual brush pickup by Town of Lansing crews. The dates of the pickup and the guidelines appear later in the Newsletter and I hope you will take advantage of this opportunity.

We are well into the budget process for the coming fiscal year with the Public Hearing scheduled for 7:35 PM on April 3rd. It is likely that the proposed increase in the tax levy will be about 3% consistent with the increase of the consumer price index for the past year. Because of the significant increases in the assessed value of the properties in the Village last year, the tax rate will likely go down from the \$1.65 per thousand for last year. Over the years, the Village has systematically reduced its reliance on New York State financial aid so that budget issues in Albany have only minor effects on Village finances.

The North Triphammer Road reconstruction project will be starting up again as soon as the weather permits. There is an article from Fisher Associates, the design and construction management firm for the project, giving more details later in the Newsletter. As with last year, there will be notices posted on the Village website about construction activities and their effect on traffic. A weekly update on the project will also appear in the Ithaca Journal. As with last year, every effort will be made to keep traffic moving during the construction activities. We anticipate being able to maintain two-way traffic most of the time with only occasional alternating one-way traffic controlled by flaggers. We anticipate that the disruption

to traffic will be no worse than last year. The project will be completely finished, including all landscaping, etc. by the end of October.

The Board of Trustees and I have been working with the Town of Lansing on deciding on a route for the sewer transmission main from the proposed Town sewer district to the Cayuga Heights Waste Water Treatment Plant. After considerable discussion and research, two possible routes remain viable. A route along the east side of East Shore Drive (State Route 34) would serve the largest number of Village residents and is the Village's preferred route. A forced main along the east side of Cayuga Heights Road to Cedar Lane and then joining our existing gravity sewer line down Cedar Lane is the other possible route. Forced mains emptying into gravity sewer lines need to be carefully engineered to avoid odors because of the retention time in the forced main. We have been assured by the engineering consultants that this can be taken care of, however, concerns remain and will have to be resolved if this is the final route. The Town has adopted the Cayuga Heights Road route as their baseline design in order to finish the design and determine the total project cost so that the project can be put forward to the voters in the proposed sewer district in the Town. The added cost of the East Shore Drive route is estimated to be \$450,000 out of a total project cost of \$17,000,000. The increased cost is due to land acquisition costs for a pump station at the bottom of the hill and increased construction costs due to satisfying New York State Department of Transportation rules along state highways. The Village has commissioned a traffic study to determine the effectiveness of possible bypass routes during the three month construction time needed for the installation of the transmission main. The study report is due by March 20th and will be submitted to NYSDOT as part of an effort to lower the cost of this preferred route. The Village will continue to work with the Town to come to an agreement on the most effective route for the sewer transmission main.

Finally, Village elections for two Trustees will be held from noon to 9:00 PM on April 25th at the Fire Station on Oakcrest Road. Incumbents Frank Moore and John O'Neill will be seeking re-election. I encourage you to vote.

PLANNING BOARD NEWS

The Planning Board's main business since the last Newsletter has been the processing of Special Permit applications. Taughannock Aviation requested permission to construct a 27,000 sf hanger at the Ithaca-Tompkins Regional Airport on Warren Road. This hanger would replace an existing older hanger and would be used to house jet aircraft during the winter season. The permit was approved. Ithaca Suites, LLC was given conditional approval to construct a 70,700 sf 91 unit extended stay hotel on the site of the existing old Cinema 4 Theater Center adjacent to the Triphammer Shopping Center. The conditions of the approval focused on drainage, parking, landscaping and lighting issues. Greenstate Properties received conditional approval for the construction of an 8,000 sf building at 2432 North Triphammer Road for the Ithaca Cardiology Associates. Conditional issues are erosion and drainage, parking, lot lighting and required easements. Nextel Partners Inc was approved to install a telecommunications facility on the existing Marriott Hotel in the Business & Technology Park on Warren Road. The facility will consist of installing panel antennae flush mounted on the four corners of the existing building. Omnipoint Communications received a conditional approval to install a 44 ft. cell tower for T-Mobile on the McDonald's property on North Triphammer Road. The cell tower will be placed at the northwest corner of the parking lot and will mimic the existing light poles except for its height. Because of a deficiency in the required fall zone area, the applicant obtained a variance from the Village's Board of Zoning Appeals. Integrated Acquisitions & Development received approval of their request to amend a previously approved Special Permit in 2003. The amendment would construct a 33,400 sf office building at 9 Brown Road in the Business & Technology Park for Advion Biosciences. All of the conditions of approval for the original Special Permit, with the exception of those pertaining to the demolition of the existing building, were applied to the approval of the amendment.

Regarding Subdivision, Greenstate Properties received approval for a minor subdivision dividing a 2.64 acre lot into two conforming lots at 2432 North Triphammer Road. The Dart Estate at 89 Graham Road received approval for a minor subdivision which created one new lot and enlarged an existing and adjoining lot. The Planning Board approved a sketch plan review for a proposed 21 lot residential subdivision located along the east side of East Shore Drive north of 1510 East Shore Drive. The next step is the submission and review of the Preliminary Plat.

There is likely to be considerable building activity within the Village this Spring in addition to the resumption of the reconstruction of North Triphammer Road. The construction of a new office building at 2431 North Triphammer Road and one for the Avdion Biosciences at 9 Brown Road in the Business & Technology District should begin soon. The demolition of the Cinema Theater in Triphammer Mall and the subsequent construction of the Homewood Suites Hotel are also anticipated to begin this spring. The construction of the Regal Stadium Theater in Pyramid Mall and the installation of a T-Mobile cell tower on the McDonald's property are also scheduled to begin this year.

VILLAGE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Spring Brush Pick-Up

The Town of Lansing Highway Department will be providing a spring brush and limb pick-up on May 1st.

Residents are asked to leave all materials near the roadside by 6:00 A.M. *Monday* morning. To assist the work crews, all limbs and brush (up to 5 inches in diameter) should be piled with the cut ends facing the same direction. The limbs should be no longer than 5 or 6 feet in length. Also, the piles should not be tied but should be left loose. It also helps if thorny materials are separated from the rest.

Each household is limited to approximately one pick-up size load. Excessive amounts will not be picked up and will become the responsibility of the homeowner to see they are removed. Leaves and trash bags will not be picked up.

LEARNING WEB'S YOUTH PROGRAMS

Attention parents of middle and high school students! Is your child looking to do something fun, meaningful and different this spring or summer? Consider *The Learning Web's Summer Service Program* or *Career Exploration Program*. Funded by the Joint Youth Commission of Tompkins County, the award-winning Summer Service Program offers middle-school-aged youth from the Town of Ithaca, Village of Cayuga Heights and the Village of Lansing the opportunity to do volunteer projects that benefit their community. The Learning Web's Career Exploration Program offers Tompkins County youth ages 11-21 opportunities to gain hands-on experience in their career fields of interest.

This summer, the Learning Web will offer a six-week *Summer Service Program*, beginning the first week in July and running until mid August. Examples of past service projects for the Summer Service Program include playing with animals at the SPCA, creating Public Service Announcements for the radio, writing letters and collecting school supplies for children with AIDS in Africa, baking and serving cookies at Loaves and Fishes, painting a porch at the Red Cross Homeless Shelter, bowling with residents at Long View Nursing Home, and more.

The Learning Web's *Career Exploration Program* includes job tours, job shadowing, and paid and unpaid apprenticeships under the one-to-one guidance of adult mentors. Through this program, youth gain practical work experience, learn more about adult roles and responsibilities, and clarify their goals for future careers and schooling. Apprentices generally meet with their work-site mentors after school, approximately 3-10 hours a week. Youth undertake apprenticeships, tours and job shadowing in areas such as veterinary medicine, computer programming, engineering, cosmetology, auto repair, law, plant science, child care, and more.

ASSESSMENT DEPARTMENT

As you know, this will be the first year for the Tri-Annual Re-evaluation process. The Director of Assessment will be determining a "Level of Assessment" for this year that will reflect the assessed value as a percentage of the current, true full market value. This process will involve the least amount of assessment changes. The intent is to maintain equity in the assessments so that everyone is at the same level. Assessments will be adjusted if an area or individual property is not at the determined "Level of Assessment". This adjustment can occur through market changes in areas and individual properties where the market values are increasing/decreasing more rapidly than the majority of properties, and the intent is to bring these homes back to the same level of assessment. Changes in assessment will also be made due to physical changes that would affect the market value of the property, i.e. home updates, improvements, demolition, additions, etc. Please note that the level of assessment can change from year-to-year and the third year of the process will be to bring everyone up to 100% of market value.

Buffalo St. Please note that the web information is very limited and more extended analysis and information can be found using our facility programs.

VILLAGE BILLS

In the Village, we have many people that go away for extended periods of time. If you will be gone during a time when your water/sewer bill is due, it is possible to pay the bill in advance to avoid a late penalty. Water and sewer bills come out quarterly at the beginning of January, April, July and October. They are then due by the 20th of that month. The only problem that we may run into is that Bolton Points policy reads that if you do not read your meter for 3 consecutive quarters, they will shut the water off. However, Bolton Point can send your meter reading card to a different person and address at your request.

Your Village Tax Bill comes to you at the beginning of June and is due by July 1st. If you do not receive your bill, please call the office and we'll be happy to send you a copy. The tax bills cannot be paid in advance and, by law, you are responsible for making sure they are paid, even if you don't receive a bill. If you have an escrow for taxes, the bills are mailed directly to the bank coded on your bill. When the bank pays taxes on a property, the receipt is then sent to the property owner.

OFFICE FOR THE AGING

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A new program, sponsored by the Tompkins County Office for the Aging in collaboration with Lifelong, has as its mission the goal of reaching 40 to 60 year olds and giving them unbiased information as they begin thinking about their possible future long-term care needs.

The concept of long-term care and its costs are not new to that age group because many have parents or other elderly relatives who need to pay for help with bathing, dressing, getting in and out of a chair, or other essential activities of daily living. What is new is that more and more people, especially those first Baby Boomers who are reaching 60, are beginning to think about how they will pay for future long-term care.

“Long-term care” is assistance that one may need over an extended period of time to manage, rather than cure, a chronic condition or to compensate for a limited ability to function. Despite the myth that Medicare or other health insurance will pick up the tab for home care, assisted living or nursing home care should they ever need it, the fact is the payment for that kind of care is usually our own responsibility. As a result, long-term care insurance has evolved as a way of transferring the risk of a long period of expensive care to an insurance company.

The Long Term Care Insurance Resources Center, recently opened at the Tompkins County Office for the Aging and at Lifelong with funding provided by New York State, are designed to help consumers sort through the myriad of options available to determine what is best for them. While long-term care insurance is an option being explored by many, it is

not the answer for everybody. Understanding long-term care and long-term care insurance is complicated and consumers need a place locally where they can go for objective, “no-sales pitch” information to help them make informed decisions about what is right for their unique situations.

The Centers offer trained long-term care counselors that will work one to one with consumers; educational materials that include consumer guides and checklists; public presentations about long-term care financing options including long-term care insurance, and how to go about choosing long-term care policies should you decide to explore that option; and group presentations to employee groups and professional organizations.

The next public workshops, entitled “Long Term Care Insurance: Is it Right for You?” will be held on Monday April 3rd from 7:00 – 8:30 PM and Saturday May 6th from 10:00 – 11:30 AM Pre-registration is required. Park Pavilions

ITHACA BREAST CANCER ALLIANCE (IBCA)

On Saturday, April 1st, the Ithaca Breast Cancer Alliance (IBCA) will hold their third annual Spin For Hope fundraiser at Courtside Racquet and Fitness Club to help support people in our area affected by breast cancer. This year, in addition to Courtside, Spin for Hope will be held at a second location, as well. People who are affiliated with Cornell (faculty, staff, or students) may participate in this great fundraising event at Cornell's Helen Newman Hall.

To join the fun on April 1st, participants pay a registration fee of \$10 per hour to spin at either location. NORTH TRIPHAMMER ROAD RECONSTRUCTION

Construction will soon resume on the North Triphammer Road Reconstruction through the Village once the weather improves for good. Last year all of the existing underground and overhead utilities were relocated. Most of the new underground drainage pipes and structures were installed and on the north end of the project the roadway, curbing and

lighting were installed. This year will focus on completing the remainder of the project including the new curbing, roadway, sidewalk, landscaping and lighting. Also to be completed this year will be the installation of northbound dual-left turn lanes at Pyramid Drive which when completed will improve the efficiency of vehicles moving through the busy intersection. Once again, the construction crews will need to restrict traffic in areas to provide areas for construction activities and your attentiveness while driving through the construction zones is appreciated. Thanks to all residents, business owners and users along the road for their patience as we make this significant upgrade of the roadway corridor.

BOARD OF ELECTIONS

The Tompkins County Board of Elections is looking for citizens who might be interested in working as Election Inspectors. Many people have found being involved in such a crucial way in our democratic process to be a very fulfilling and rewarding experience.

This year it will also be a bit more monetary rewarding, too. Inspector pay rises to \$100 for the Primary, and \$160 for the General Election. Inspectors will also be paid \$25 to attend mandatory training.

He presented Town Supervisor Steve Farkas and the Town Board with a certificate and star map from the International Star Registry. The certificate notes the name of the star, it's coordinates and the date of registration. The registration date is July 22, 2005 which is "coincidentally the date of the first weekly issue of our newspaper," Veaner said with a smile.

The publication also gave the Town a star map and stack of cards that tell how to find the star in Lansing's night sky. These cards are available at the Village Office, the Town Hall and the Ithaca ScienceCenter. They have also been given to Lansing Elementary School science teachers so kids can find their own town's star while studying astronomy.

STREET TREE PLANTING PROGRAM

The Street Tree Planting Program seeks to encourage the planting of shade trees along Village streets. The Village offers to reimburse homeowners 75% of the cost of a tree, up to a maximum of \$75 per tree. To qualify, please follow these procedures:

- Make application to enter the tree planting program before the tree is purchased. Applications may be picked up at the Village Office or by calling the Village Office (257-0424) and requesting an application be mailed to you.
- The location for the planted tree must be mutually agreed upon by the property owner and a representative of the Village prior to planting.
- Reimbursement shall take place upon presentation of a receipt from a recognized nursery and approval of the planted tree by a Village representative.
- Any one property owner will be eligible for reimbursement of up to two trees in any year.
- Applicants will be accepted on a first-come, first-serve basis.
